NATIONAL POLICE WEEK 2008

In 1962, President John F. Kennedy signed a proclamation designating May 15th as "Peace Officers Memorial Day" and the week in which that date falls as "Police Week". Every year since, tens of thousands of law enforcement officers from around the world converge on Washington, DC to participate in a number of planned events to honor those that have paid the ultimate sacrifice.

The first official memorial service took place on May 15, 1982. On that date, approximately 125 people gathered in Senate Park to honor 91 law enforcement officers. Over the past 22 years we have honored over 3,000 law enforcement officers from around our nation. Today, the National Peace Officers' Memorial Service has become one in a series of events which includes the Candlelight Vigil, which is sponsored by the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund (NLEOMF) and seminars sponsored by Concerns of Police Survivors (COPS).

The Grand Lodge of the Fraternal Order of Police and the Grand Lodge Auxiliary of the Fraternal Order of Police are very proud to be the official sponsor of the Memorial Service.

National Police Week is a collaborative effort of many organizations dedicated to honoring the service and sacrifice of America's law enforcement

community. Principal organizers of National Police Week are - National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial Fund (NLEOMF), which sponsors the annual Candlelight Vigil at the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial; Fraternal Order of Police/Fraternal Order of Police Auxiliary (FOP/FOPA), which organize the Peace Officers Memorial Day Service at the U.S. Capitol; Concerns of Police Survivors (COPS), which holds the National Police Survivors' Conference.

The following schedule includes a number of National Police Week-related events in the Washington, DC, area. The 20th Annual Candlelight Vigil will be held at the National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial on Tuesday, May 13, 2008. Sponsored by the NLEOMF, the event will begin at 8:00 p.m. at the Memorial grounds, located at Judiciary Square, in the 400 block of E Street, NW,

Washington, DC. A reading of the names newly engraved on the Memorial immediately follows the ceremony. Everyone is welcome to attend; no tickets are required.

A Brief History of the Fraternal Order of Police


In 1915, the life of a policeman was bleak. In many communities they were forced to work 12 hour days, 365 days a year. Police officers didn't like it, but there was little they could do to change their working conditions. There were no organizations to make their voices heard; no other means to make their grievances known.

This soon changed, thanks to the courage and wisdom of two Pittsburgh patrol officers. Martin Toole and Delbert Nagle knew they must first organize police officers, like other labor interests, if they were to be successful in making life better for themselves and their fellow police officers. They and 21 others "who were willing to take a chance" met on May 14, 1915, and held the first meeting of the Fraternal Order of Police. They formed Fort Pitt Lodge #1.

They decided on this name due to the anti-union sentiment of the time. However, there was no mistaking their intentions. As they told their city mayor, Joe Armstrong, the FOP would be

the means "to bring our grievances before the Mayor or Council and have many things adjusted that we are unable to present in any other way...we could get many things through our legislature that our Council will not, or cannot give us."

And so it began, a tradition of police officers representing police officers. The Fraternal Order of Police was given life by two dedicated police officers determined to better their profession and those who choose to protect and serve our communities, our states, and our country. It was not long afterward that Mayor Armstrong was congratulating the Fraternal Order of Police for their "strong influence in the legislatures in various states,...their considerate and charitable efforts" on behalf of the



officers in need and for the FOP's "efforts at increasing the public confidence toward the police to the benefit of the peace, as well as the public."

From that small beginning the Fraternal Order of Police began growing steadily. In 1917, the idea of a National Organization of Police Officers came about.


Today, the tradition that was first envisioned over 90 years ago lives on with more than 2,100 local lodges and more than 325,000 members in the United States. The Fraternal Order of Police has

become the largest professional police organization in the country. The FOP continues to grow because we have been true to the tradition and continued to build on it. The Fraternal Order of Police are proud professionals working on behalf of law enforcement officers from all ranks and levels of government.

The National Fraternal Order of Police chartered The Hodgkins F.O.P. Lodge #151 on December 1st, 1981. Since

that time, our Lodge has been active in many local charities and benefits. Our commitment to our community is a primary objective for our organization. Some of the causes we have and will continue to support are, the Lyons Township Little League, St. Jude Children's Hospital, Annual projects at the Hodgkins Elementary School and we have proudly established Annual Scholarships for local High School Graduates and is responsible for building the Hodgkins Veterans Memorial.

Obviously, we take great pride in our organization and the accomplishments that we have made over the years. We are committed to this event and are asking for your assistance. Our success for the past 26 years is due to your support.



Is It A Cold or The Flu?

Before you choose a treatment, it helps to know what you have. Distinguishing between a cold and the flu can sometimes be tricky. To be certain, doctors now can perform a quick office test that identifies *influenza*. The test eventually will be available as a home kit. Meanwhile, here are the symptoms to look for:

<i>SYMPTOMS:</i>	<i>COLD:</i>	<i>FLU:</i>
Fever	Rare	Characteristic, high (102-104 Degrees) Lasts 3-4 days
Headache	Rare	Prominent
General aches, pains	Slight	Usual, often severe
Fatigue, weakness	Quite mild	Can last up to 3 weeks
Extreme exhaustion	Never	Early and prominent
Stuffy Nose	Common	Sometimes
Sore Throat	Common	Sometimes
Chest discomfort, cough	Mild to moderate, hacking cough	Common, can become severe
Sneezing	Usual	Sometimes
Complications	Sinus congestion or earache	Bronchitis, can be life-threatening

HODGKINS POLICE DEPARTMENT HIRES FOUR NEW OFFICERS

In response to staffing needs and preparation for future retirements, the Village of Hodgkins has hired four new police officers this past year.

In January and February 2007, the Department hired Ryan Carrasquillo and Jeff Keilman as patrol officers. Ofc. Carrasquillo is a member of the United States Marine Corps and is currently serving as a reservist.

Joseph Balsitis and Matthew Hosteny attended the Police Training Institute at the University of Illinois in

Champaign, Illinois. They graduated from the Police Academy on December 6th and subsequently began their 12 week field training program with the Hodgkins Police Department.

For the first time, the Hodgkins Police Department will be able to maintain a minimum of three officers on shift around the clock. This provides more police presence and protection for the residents of the Village of Hodgkins, in addition to increasing officer safety concerns.

THE NATIONAL LAW ENFORCEMENT OFFICER'S MEMORIAL

The National Law Enforcement Officers Memorial was dedicated in 1991 by President George H.W. Bush.

It honors all of America's federal, state and local law enforcers. Inscribed on the Memorial's blue-gray marble walls are the names of more than 17,500 officers who have been killed in the line of

duty, dating back to the first known death in 1792.

Designed by Washington, DC architect Davis Buckley, the Memorial sits on three acres of federal park land called Judiciary Square. The site has served for over 200 years as the seat of our nation's judicial branch of government. A glance around the space finds plush carpets of grass, nearly 60,000 plants and 128 trees decorating the Memorial grounds. Each year, around the first of April, some 14,000 daffodils make the Memorial



one of Washington's most spectacular attractions.

Bordering the Memorial's beautifully landscaped park are two tree-lined "pathways of remembrance" where the names of the fallen officers are engraved.

The names of the fallen officers are displayed in random order on the Memorial Wall. At an

annual candlelight vigil held each year during National Police Week (in May) new names of fallen officers are added to the Memorial.

Each of the pathway entrances are adorned with a powerful statuary grouping of an adult lion protecting its cubs. The bronze statues were sculpted by Raymond Kaskey. They symbolize the protective role of our law officers and convey the strength, courage and valor that are the hallmarks of those who serve in law enforcement.
